Editorial

This is the first parish letter of 2024, so happy New Year to everybody. We all have our hopes and wishes for the New Year and for me two lines from the Christmas carol "It came upon the midnight clear" seem to sum it up.

"Hush your noise, you men of strife, and hear the angels sing".

It was obviously appropriate to Edmund Sears in 1849 when he wrote the poem, which was set to the familiar tune by Richard Storrs Willis the next year. Edmund Sears probably had in mind the recently ended Mexican-American war and revolution in Europe. Of course, there has been war and strife ever since, but this past year seems to have been particularly bad.

We have had the war in Ukraine for nearly two years now and it is still going on, and now the awful conflict in the Middle East which seems to be overflowing into neighbouring countries and looks to get more and more dangerous to world peace as each day passes. The television news is often distressing to watch, and it is difficult to see any hope of peace and stability in the world of today.

And yet I believe that the angels are still singing, bringing the good news of the incarnation to the world of our day. Now and again the sound of the angels singing breaks through the noise of war and strife. In the laughter of children, and in the songs of the birds, I hear the angels sing. Sometimes in our church services, particularly over Christmas time, with the shepherds I have heard the angels sing to bring the story of the Christ child born in a manger to ordinary people like you and me.

Jesus was born at a time of conflict and war, similar to today. He had to become a refugee in Egypt to escape the brutality of Herod. Yet the story of Jesus is still told to countless people throughout the world, changing the lives of people in so many ways.

I think that I am becoming more and more aware of what a noisy world we live in. It is not just where there is war, but everywhere. Advertisers and celebrities on television seem to think they can only communicate by shouting their messages.

So my wish for the New Year is for a quieter and more peaceful world. Jesus came into a world of conflict and declared that he had come to bring peace. Perhaps, if we listen carefully, we will hear the angels sing, and follow the shepherds and the wise men to worship the child born to be King.

Report from the Queen Camel Parish Council:

The Parish Council (PC) met on Monday 15 January 2024 and covered the following key matters

- David Lowe was co-opted on to the PC to fill the remaining casual vacancy.
- With several representatives from Sutton Montis in the public gallery there was a long discussion on the activities at Sutton Farm and the high volume of the Hopkins Estates' lorries on the local roads. Great concern was expressed on the environmental impact of the earth moving activity and whether it is permitted or not and of the serious health and safety issues of so many lorry movements on the road from Queen Camel to Sutton Farm. There is a very serious risk to walkers, cyclists and horse riders from these huge lorries quite apart from the damage they are doing to the road itself. It was agreed that the PC would put forward two representatives to help form a lobby group with the neighbouring villages to get all the authorities involved to review the unacceptable situation. Please contact our representatives, Roy Lawrenson and David Lowe, if you have questions on this or have suggestions on how to solve it.
- The Somerset Councillors reported the difficult financial position of Somerset Council and how it needs to divest assets and services. Parish and town councils may have to take on more of SC's activities at an extra cost in future precepts.
- There was a discussion with comments from the public on the threat to the No 1 bus service from Yeovil to Shepton Mallet which the operator, South West Coaches (SWC), says is uneconomic unless its subsidy from Somerset Council (SC) is increased. SWC are likely to give notice that the service will stop in mid April. However before that there is likely to be a tender for a modified service on this route. It was particularly noted that, apart from the potential environmental issue of more cars on the roads, if there is no bus service the elderly, others who do not drive and the young getting to college badly need the service. The long term cost of not having a bus service is likely to be far higher than any possible increase in the subsidy. Please use the bus as much as possible and submit your concerns to SC in its budget consultation and our MP, Sarah Dyke. We are working with the Somerset Bus Partnership's Yeovil user group.
- There was a further discussion on flooding issues. The PC fully supports the River Cam Flood Warning Group (which is meeting on 31 January at the Memorial Hall) and will engage with it through our Flood Committee. The PC also noted the need to work with the various authorities in significantly increasing the flood attenuation areas.
- The PC and its tender board are moving forward with the plans to get the new play area installed. Expressions of interest are being received from potential suppliers which will be analysed and the most suitable will be asked formally to tender.
- The Playing Field Management Committee reported on its activities. As previously reported it has secured an arrangement with Ilchester FC that needs football pitches to use this winter. Anyone who can volunteer to help keep the pitches in good order for matches would be most welcome; please contact John Carnegie or Phil Jones.
- The PC considered further the budgets for next year and the precept. Given the reduction in services from SC and cost inflation it was decided that there should be a 20% increase in the precept, based on 15% for the PC's continuing activities and a 5% uplift as a reserve to cover any additional services which are no longer provided by SC. It should be noted that there has been no increase in the precept for two years.

• The PC and many other organisations in the village need volunteers so if you feel you could contribute please contact me or any councillor. Details can be obtained from the PC website.

Cam Vale Tuesday Group: 2nd January 2024

Despite meeting immediately after the New Year holiday on a thorough miserable day, some 21 of us enjoyed a most interesting talk by Trudi and Clare, two of the three Health Coaches at the Queen Camel Surgery. Between them all they offer an incredible range of services which includes home visits, advice on healthy and practical ways for patients to maintain their independence, help with accessing the Library Home Service plus dementia care. In addition there is a rehab team which includes a physiotherapist and an occupational therapist. They also offer help to carers and for those facing bereavement or loneliness and isolation. For those struggling with modern technology, they offer assistance with applications for Attendance Allowances, Blue Badges, etc. and also give advice and help to anyone struggling to give up smoking or vaping. Over and above this, they organise walks of differing lengths to help those with mobility issues as well as arranging hospital transport and even help with care for pets can be offered where necessary. We all concluded that anyone registered with the Queen Camel Medical Centre was extremely fortunate.

After the talk, a wide ranging and interesting quiz took place organised by Georgina, a committee member.

Our next meeting will be on Tuesday, February 6th at 10am in the Queen Camel Memorial Hall.

West Camel Book Group Review

Nine Book Group members enjoyed sitting by the fire and discussing Annie Proulx's 'Barkskins' on Wednesday 10th. This was a weighty tome that required perseverance to finish. It was impressive that even those who had not found it easy to enter into the intricacies of the novel persevered to the end. This is a book with so many facts and details about the lifestyle of peoples in the North American New World that it loses its sense of story at times. Nonetheless there were chunks of the novel that were both gripping and surprising. The brutalities of the time were recorded in abundance and English white people come out of it pretty badly as did Missionaries. The marks ranged from 2 to 9 with an average of 6, but most felt it was worth reading. Annie Proulx writes with beautifully crafted prose and succeeds in highlighting the devastation we have brought on ourselves by greedily chopping down forests and destroying habitats. Criticisms include: Admirable but self-indulgent writing; AP doesn't think about her readers and there are too many loose ends.

Our next read is altogether easier and lighter weight. The Walnut Tree should have reopened so we look forward to getting together again on Wednesday 14th February at 7.30pm.

LIVING WITH PAIN IS A PAIN BUT THERE IS HOPE!

Do you live with a long-term persistent pain condition? Does it affect your sleep, and emotional wellbeing? Does it restrict your daily activities and stop you doing the things you want to do?

The Rural Practice Network (a group of 5 local GP surgeries covering Castle Cary, Bruton, Wincanton, Queen Camel & Milborne Port), has a non-medical pain management programme called Live Well with Pain – the Ten Footsteps – which is available to people registered with any of these 5 surgeries, with two opportunities for people in Queen Camel!

The Old School is increasingly coming back to life after the devastating flood last May. This is an update following the January/ December magazine
