#### **Editorial**

November. What springs to mind when you think of this month?

Fireworks with all their colours and patterns and loud bangs, TV presenters and newsreaders wearing red poppies in their lapels. The countdown to Christmas in our shops; wherever we turn there will be enticing images of gifts and food which will make our Christmas 'perfect'. The clocks have changed to GMT which has shortened the light hours considerably and the weather can be fickle. This will mean that for some there is less socialising or seeing neighbours for a friendly chat, for others it will mean going to work and returning home in the dark. Our children play more inside rather than letting off energy outside. The grass stops growing, so no need for regular mowing.

The list could be endless and there are positive and negative aspects of each.

For some November will bring loneliness and the possibility of increased risk of illness. So how can we approach the beginning of winter this year?

It's all too easy to adopt a pessimistic attitude because of changes in the season which affect our moods and maybe our lives. It could mean a little more hardship in the way we go about our everyday lives, no longer the ease of walking out the door with no thought of a coat. Instead, the need to wrap up warm with a torch in our pockets, possibly boots on our feet, all needing a little more effort to sort out.

We don't hear children complaining about the puddles to jump in or leaf mounds to kick, the excitement of a bonfire or the expectations of what Christmas will bring. Their minds are carefree, their expectations high. They are more likely to be present in each moment than to think too far ahead.

Jesus asks us all to be more like children. To be expectant of good things, to live in the moment, to put God first and to love and care for others like we love and care for ourselves.

St Paul encourages us to keep our minds thinking about whatever is true, whatever is respected, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever can be loved, whatever is well thought of, if there is anything good and worth giving thanks for, to get on and do it, because by practising this mindset it will bring us peace within ourselves.

At a time in our world where peace is becoming a rarity for many, it is good to think about the truth we read in the gospels; the story that will be retold throughout the world once more next month. That a saviour of the world has been born, has lived among us, has died and is resurrected to new life. A life we all can be a part of. A life which brings hope and healing, light and love. An understanding that everyone is accepted no matter what creed, colour or race.

As we move into the run up to Christmas I encourage you to take some 'me time' and reread the nativity story for yourself, thinking about the part you might have played within the story.

Were you the inn keeper, short on room and time? Or maybe an official taking tallies of the census? Were you Joseph, who had the weight of how to care for his wife, or Mary, trusting that all would be well?

Sometimes we allow circumstances to dictate whether we are a 'glass half full' or a 'glass half empty' person. I think this year more than ever we need to be reminded of the Nativity story and why it happened.



#### **West Camel Churches Together**

On Sunday 13th October we celebrated our Harvest Festival. The church was beautifully decorated. On Sunday morning, a Family Service, led by the Rev. Caroline Walker, was followed by a delicious Harvest Lunch. The collection and profits on the lunch raised £222 for the Farming Community Network — a charity which helps farmers who are going through difficult times.

In the afternoon, the Harvest Praise service was led by Ray Ursell. The service included a short film about Tear Fund's Community Transformation Project in Africa. After the service, perishable items such as fruit and veg were disposed of in return for donations. The collection, together with donations for the produce, raised £301 for Tearfund. All the donations of tinned and packaged food have been taken to 'The Lord's Larder' food bank at Yeovil.

#### **Report from the Queen Camel Parish Council**

The Parish Council (PC) did not have a meeting in October, but some important matters have arisen.

The question of **road safety and speed watch** was discussed at a public meeting on 2 October. The principal objective was to see if a speed watch project could be established to provide evidence to support the perception of speeding through the village. The Police and Somerset Council (SC) will not initiate action, or provide funding, based on anecdote, but require clear evidence. Although a few villagers were willing to support a Community Speed Watch (CSW) it cannot progress without a volunteer to coordinate it.

The meeting wished for **Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs)** to be installed and for the **20mph speed limit** to be extended from the Old School to the new school. These measures are being explored, identifying restrictions on positioning of SIDS and implementation of 20mph zones. Without evidence to satisfy the Police and SC, funding and support for these projects will be a challenge. The PC similarly has to justify its public spending as well as complying with requirements of other authorities. Whilst acknowledging that there will always be those drivers who speed, the PC is undertaking informal checks on traffic to see how effective the existing traffic calming measures are.

The question of a **pedestrian crossing** was raised. There is no SC budget available this year for road crossings and dropped kerbs. We have been told that even if there were, due to the current measures with two road narrowing pinch points, Queen Camel will not be considered for additional crossings. Please remember to find a safe place to cross with good visibility in both directions (SEE and BE SEEN). The lack of visibility for cars **turning right** out of **Church Path** was also raised. This is still within the 20mph zone, but additional cautionary measures for drivers are being considered.

**HGVs driving through the village** in contravention of the weight restriction remain of concern. The Police lack resources to prosecute, but the nuisance caused through improper or unlawful use of vehicles is anti-social behaviour (ASB), which is a policing priority! If you are alarmed or distressed by the continual use of Queen Camel as a 'rabbit run' by HGVs then please report this ASB to Avon and Somerset Police, using its website, so they get a clear picture and can respond.

**Hopkins lorries** have continued to get close attention. Continuing attempts are being made to bring pressure on SC with the help of our local councillors and MP. Although lorries are 'legitimately' using the A359 for access to Sutton Farm, the PC, in collaboration with other PCs, are trying to hold SC to account for its lack of enforcement for potential breaches of planning. You can reinforce your concerns by reporting this type of ASB to SC through its website, so it too is constantly reminded of the affect this is having on local communities. Also our Community Safety Officer can investigate.

I expect the traffic and speed issues will be discussed again at the next **PC's meeting** on **18 November.** If you have any matters you would like to raise with the PC please contact me or any councillor.

#### **Book Club review of The Year of the Locust by Terry Hayes**

After some warnings from reviewers that the plot in The Year of the Locust went into the realms of sci-fi several of us approached the novel with trepidation. However, perhaps forewarned is forearmed, and I was drawn into the complicated story and was happy to travel into a world of possibility and subdue my need for reality. The book has four distinct parts and for some the novel could have been truncated without losing its purpose. The level of detail was evocative and the knots were all tied up very tidily. If you like thriller style novels then you will enjoy this. Even allowing for the suspension of belief in the last quarter of the novel, it averaged a mark of over 8 from the group of 9 of us present, slightly less from those who weren't able to join us. Be prepared for some violence and worrying implications of meddling in space. After his first novel, which anticipated the threat of a pandemic, we should perhaps take his subject matter seriously?



#### **Cam Vale Tuesday Group: October 2024**

Sonja Rogers works for the National Trust and is responsible for looking after many of the artifacts in some of their stately homes. She came to talk to us specifically on tapestries. They come from many areas overseas and reflect the culture and the flora and fauna of these areas. Sadly, as the tapestries are made of organic materials, namely silk, wool and cotton, they soon deteriorate, so many are kept in store where light cannot cause any more harm. The darker the pigments used, the more they fade.

At present Montacute House has its top two floors shut off as there is important work going on to ensure the stone staircases are sound. But it is still worth a visit.

In 1947, 10 Queen Anne dining chairs were loaned to the National Trust by Sir John Chester. They were accepted in lieu of a tax scheme upon certain conditions: they must be displayed for at least 100 days a year, and they must be kept in good order. Each high backed chair tells a story based on classical myths that are not always pleasant. The work needed took nearly 5 years. But the end result is stunning, especially now as they are displayed in front of a recently restored tapestry of a knight. This tapestry, due in part to the pandemic, took from 2017 to 2021 to be restored to its former glory.

Our November guest will be the well-known Children's Book Illustrator, Jane Chapman. She will talk a little on her work and will then attempt to turn us all into artists!


